- A 14-line poem
- The form originated in Italy.
- The invention of the sonnet is attributed to Giacomo Da Lentini.

Umbr

- The sonnet has a rhyme scheme that varies depending on the type of sonnet.
- The sonnet body is made up of parts such as: octet; sestet; volta; couplings.

What Year Is it, and WHAT HAPPENS in Italy?

Though **Giacomo Da Lentini** is attributed with **inventing the form in the 13**th **century (1200s)**,

It is Francesco Petrarch who popularized and elevated the sonnet form in the 1300s. Petrarch lived from 1307-1374

Petrarch relied upon <u>classical symbols</u> and the subject of <u>courtly love</u> in the sonnet. These become known as the <u>Petrarchan Conventions</u>.

Petrarch's Contributions – The Petrarchan Conventions

- 1. Love is horribly painful, and results in suffering!
- 2.An idealized love. The idealized love is: young and beautiful; unattainable/already spoken for; pure and virtuous; refuses the speaker in a cruel or cold way.
- 3. Love occurs "at first sight."
 - 4. Love is equal to a religious experience, which makes him a more noble, better human being.
 - 5. References religious symbols, and classical gods.
 - 6. Poetry lives forever, and immortalizes the loved person.


English Form Versus the Italian Form

- Like the Italian, the English form may use religious imagery, symbols, and terms.
- It <u>also</u> relies on classical terms, references or allusions to Greek gods.
- BOTH English and Italian work to elevate the woman, the writer, the poem itself, and the seriousness of the writer's ardor (love).

- UNLIKE the Italian form, The English form differs in the following ways:
 - Rhyme Scheme
 - Meter
- The changes were most likely done to improve how the sonnet worked in a new language.




 16th century (1500s), The Sonnet Arrives in England

- Though the men above introduced the Petrarchan or Italian Sonnet, many writers loved and championed the sonnet form. Just some are:
 - Edmund Spenser, Philip Sidney and his niece Mary Wroth, and of course. . .

- The Italian or Petrarchan

- And the Spenserian – named after Edmund Spenser!

Standard Italian or Petrarchan Rhyme Scheme is: abba, abba

Standard English or

Shakespearian Rhyme Scheme
a b a b, c d c d, e f e f, g g

Standard English or Spenserian Rhyme Scheme abab, bcbc, cdcd, ee

Shakespeare, the Rock Star of Sonnets

- Like Petrarch before him, and Spenser, Shakespeare was so influential he has a sonnet named after him!
- We have counted up to 154 sonnets attributed to Shakespeare.
- Shakespeare used
 Petrarch's conventions but also <u>questioned and</u> <u>surpassed</u> them.



Shakespeare Reached the Top by Going *Further* Than Anyone Else


- In "Sonnet 130" he honors an ordinary woman ("My mistress' eyes are nothing like the sun.")
 - The "Dark Lady," sonnets (#s 127-152) feature an UN-idealized women, *neither* young, nor pure.
 - He wrote sonnets about a male youth <u>not</u> a typical subject, again showing his willingness to write *outside* the originally strict Petrarchan sonnet.

And the Road Continues. . .

- Shakespeare was unrivalled in his ability.
- To this day masters of writing create in the sonnet form.
- Some famous British and Irish sonneteers include Milton, John Donne, W.H. Auden, Dylan Thomas, Wordsworth Elizabeth Barrett Browning, Thomas Hardy and W. B. Yeats.
- American contributors to the form include: Robert Frost and Edna St. Vincent Millay.
- Other American writers of sonnets include James Weldon Johnson, Gwendolyn Brooks, Marilyn Nelson, Derek Walcott, Marilyn Nelson, and more.
- Sonnets are written in English speaking countries everywhere to this day.
